**Historical Note:**

The Women's Literary Club was founded on November 3rd, 1909, when fourteen women from the Champaign area gathered at the house of Lora Dexter (the Club's first President) with the stated goal of forming a literary society. It was agreed that the Club would meet once per month with a different member acting as hostess each time, and a 5 cent penalty would be imposed for non-attendance. This last requirement was soon dropped due to lack of need. By years end the Club had fifty active members, and this was declared to be the maximum number of active members the club would have at any one time.

Each meeting of the Literary Club was referred to as a program, and the chief activity of each of these programs was members discussing their thoughts on the books (usually two or three of them) that the club members had been assigned to read at the conclusion of the last program. While the subject of these books were initially chosen on a month to month basis by the early 1920s all the programs of a given year would focus on a single theme. This theme could be an important issue of the day, such as the Women's rights movement, or the history and culture of an individual nation, such as Japan or Russia. Club members would donate money to the Urbana Free Library to enable them to purchase the required reading material for these different programs and afterwards these books would become part of the library's permanent collection. Other activities that occurred during programs were member readings of poems and essays they composed themselves, singing of songs chosen by the hostess of that month, and brief lectures given by guest speakers, usually related to the theme of the program.

The Women's Literary Club joined both the State and District Federation of Women's Clubs in 1910 but voted to leave the State Federation in 1920 and the District Federation in 1933 because both these organizations were explicitly focused on service projects, which was deemed to be outside the purview of the Literary Club. Nevertheless, the Club was active in various charity works during its existence,

such as donating food and clothing to school children during the Great Depression as well as donating to international aid organizations such as the Armenian Relief Fund during World War I.

**Scope and Content Note:**
